

#### Meet the Stadium Manager

Rodney Parade is renowned for the standard of its playing surface, winning accolades from visiting teams and supporters as well as the home crowd. Black & Amber Alliance took the opportunity to speak to **Mark Jones** the man responsible for the ground. The 43 year old "Caerphilly boy" has been at RP has Head grounds man for over 20 years, recently his title and responsibilities evolved and he became Stadium Manager and Safety Officer for the club. Mark is pretty keen on many sports, originally starting out as an apprentice at Sheffield United FC.

When things there didn't work out they released him, and he found himself in the big wide world with no formal qualifications. Mark knew that he wanted to do something connected with sport and that he was cut out for an indoor 9 to 5 job, luckily he found employment at Cardiff Athletic Club on the ground staff. 18 months later he applied for the role of Head grounds man here at Newport, this meant looking after not just the rugby pitch but the tennis, bowls, hockey and athletics grounds as well. Traditionally the head grounds man lived in the clubs house on site, Mark wanted to live at home with his family and travel daily, he did not get the job! A few weeks later the club approached him again saying that things weren't working and would he consider joining after all, so at 19 he became the youngest head grounds man in Britain. I was struck by the diversity of Marks duties, not just turning out the best playing surface in Wales, whilst I was talking to him he had demands ranging from supplying freshly pumped up balls for a training session to arranging an internet connection for one of the offices. What I quickly realised was that the stadium was everything inside the gates and not just the ground!

The pitch itself is a product of many hours of hard work, the season is getting longer and with 2 sides playing on the same surface the difficulties doubled, throw in the IRB Junior World Cup and then we begin to see the enormity of the challenge. Modern stadiums like the Liberty benefit from all sorts of technical help, apparently fibre is woven into the grass to support growth and prevent divots, costing an estimated £50K a year. The Rodney Parade pitch has no scientific help, it is the original grass laid on all sorts of rubble and poor quality soil, what it does have though is years of loving care, sand, seed and "good stuff." The other thing it benefits from his the hours of dedicated effort put in by Marks, James and Kyle. No prewoven fibres for our divots, just hard work and a garden fork!

From the terraces I have heard tales of the drainage system that releases surplus water direct into the river, this was all news to Mark and is purely "terrace talk!"

At least these days much of the training is done away from the main pitch, in years gone by it was normal for the teams to train on a wild and wet Thursday night leaving the pitch as a quagmire prior to an important match on a Saturday afternoon. It appears that many a battle was fought and lost over this issue, however as Mark says "the rugby must come first!"

These days Mark is also often called upon by other local rugby clubs to advise on, and in some cases assist, with the preparation of their pitches. Straight after our interview he was off to fertilise the Cross Keys pitch!

The possible future arrival of Bristol RFC and the scheduled regeneration of the ground will both provide immense challenges to Mark, however rather than being daunted by this he was excited at the prospect. The ground regeneration will provide the logistical problem that currently the vast majority of every crowd arrives from the clubhouse end of the ground. Once work starts the area roughly from the dead ball line to the squash club will become a building site, around which several thousand people must travel in safety. Definitely a concern for the safety officer! Another area that falls under Marks remit is that of stewarding, here he is trying to develop a proactive "can do" attitude, preferring to discuss any issues rather than act purely as an enforcement body.

PA announcer is a job that Mark has less fond memories of. Sometime ago a weekly meeting the subject of "who's doing the PA this week" was discussed at length, then it was discussed again and again. Mark said "as a last resort I'll do it, now can we move on?" Low and behold that weekend there was no tannoy announcer and Mark had to keep his word. With his customary enthusiasm he set about whipping the crowd into frenzy, as the teams entered the arena he came out with the immortal words, "let's get ready to rumble!" Apparently the players "game faces" were replaced with fits of laughter and the pre match exhortations of the coach were duly forgotten! One fan appraising Marks efforts as a disgrace, another later wrote "flogging would be too good for him!" This is not an area that Mark intends entering again!

A final and perhaps little known fact is that Mark has represented Newport RFC in a competitive match, as a fearless winger he holds the unequalled distinction of having scored in every game he's played for us! Before you start searching the history books I can tell you that due to severe man power shortages Mark made his try scoring debut for Newport United against Pontypridd Athletic, the following

week he was on the replacements bench for the first team, apparently declining to take the field for fear of losing his 100% record! Unsurprisingly he has not been called upon again!

Friends of Newport Rugby would like to thank Mark for this insight into his life as Stadium Manager, frankly it barely does it justice. For the best playing surface in Wales and much more we are truly grateful.

## Some New Faces (and some not so new!)

**Sven Cronk (Head Coach)** Last years Forwards Coach steps up this season to become Head Coach. Sven was born in Usk, 27 June 1969. He played for Machen, Cardiff and Glam Wanderers before joining Newport in 1994/5. Sven was Captain of Newport 1998/9 before joining Pontypridd in 1999/0. Rejoined Newport RFC in 2003/4 and made



Player-coach 2004/5. 182 appearances and 8 tries. Sven has also represented Wales at Judo.



Jon Bryant (Backs Coach) Aberdare born Jon joined Newport Gwent Dragons from Warriors in 2004/5. He had previously played for Pontypridd. He made his Newport RFC debut at Ebbw Vale on Nov 17th 2004 when Newport lost 17-15. Jon joined Cardiff Blues in Dec 2004 before rejoining Ngd's, he then moved to Sale

Sharks 2006/7. Jon has made 3 Appearances for Newport RFC and scored 1 try. Last season Jon was head coach at Merthyr RFC. **Dai Gray (Forwards Coach)** Dai attended West Mon School and played for Pontypool Youth. He joined Newport from Pontypool Utd in 1993/94 where he was the youngest ever



captain and he played against Newport RFC in the 92/93 Welsh cup, Newport winning 10 – 0 at Pontypool! He became Newport U21 coach, later Pontypool forwards coach, eventually succeeding Steve "Junna" Jones as head coach.



Matthew Amos (Second Row) Newport born, played for Cardiff Uni, Pill Harriers, Pontypool and has made 54 appearances for Cardiff CFC



**Alex Murphy (Prop)** 23 years old from Glamorgan Wanderers with the additional experience of international age grade honours at

Wales U16, U18 and U19, also played for Cardiff RFC

**Dan McShane (No 8)** 28 years old Cardiff born, played for Crawshay's and Cardiff Blues as well as Cardiff, Aberavon and Neath.



**Matthew Pizey (Winger)** Caerphilly-born joins from Bedwas.

#### **Tom Issacs (Scrum Half)** Played for Glamorgan Wanderers & Cardiff RFC. Represented Wales & Cardiff blues at U20



Tom Riley (Centre)

Joins from Pontypridd with international honours at Wales Youth, U18, FIRA U19 and a the Grand Slam winning Wales U21 alongside a contract

with the Blues Academy, making his senior regional debut in 2006.

**Paul Jones (Wing or Full Back)** Paul has previously played for Bridgend, Cardiff, Pertemp Bees, Coventry & Cornish Pirates.





#### **Newport Former Players Association**

Thought it would be good to share this fascinating insight from Dennis Perrott, Secretary of the NFPA. We are very grateful to Dennis for this contribution.

As a person representing former players predominantly of the 50 & 60's era it is perhaps difficult to put anything together that was classed as news as I am sure that the youngest supporter would have, out of sheer pride, of Newport RFC already researched in great depth the magnificence of the clubs history. Many if not most of the present Former Players played their rugby in the halcyon days of the 1950's & 60's. It was during theses decades that the name of Newport RFC became synonymous with greatness and their name reverberated around the rugby world. Newport RFC, along with Cardiff RFC, according to journalists, were the greatest club sides in the world. This claim could be well justified, for where else could 15 players be teamed together to take on touring sides from South Africa, New Zealand and Australia? Most Newport players of this period experienced at least one victory, some two, Keith Poole played three touring sides never losing! I myself played three touring sides and lost only once, 3-0 against SA 60/61.

Why do I write so glowingly and with so much pride about Newport Rugby? Well it was while most of us were watching the great Newport team of the 50's, that we, aspiring young schoolboy rugby players were inspired to set our ambitions so high, to one day play for Newport RFC. There after our pride was to be the best we could and never let the colours and wonderful name of Newport RFC down. Once in the team the weekly challenge was to stay in as there were many wonderful players waiting to replace you.

Now were does this short but simple scenario fit into and contribute to the formation of the Newport Former Players Association? Well the answer is simple, as a player you had achieved so much by being part of a great Newport team it played a massive part in your life. A group of former players decided that this greatness and the nostalgia of being part of it and its history should be preserved and perpetuated. In 1985 the FPA was formed and it continues to flourish, organising regular reunions, sometimes with other clubs, just to share a drink and reminisce rugby experiences of wonderful years gone by.

Dennis played 207 times for Newport RFC between 1961/2 &1970/1, in that period he scored 78 tries. He also played for Abertillery, London Welsh, Newbridge, Oakdale, & Represented Crawshays. Dennis was a PE teacher at Cross Keys College. You may have heard of Utility Warehouse, but not know much about it or how it can benefit householders and FoNR.
